He knew that people had been beheaded for a lesser crime than killing a goose, so he decided to run away to get away from the wrath of the King and his parents. He and his cousin got on a ship and came from England to America. They had to work in the shipyard in Boston to pay their fares.



silence, have frequent opportunities for conversing. I have seen them converse whilst passing in file to and from chapel; and I have seen the cleaners talking under the doors to the various classes. I have known letters sent out of the gaol by untried felons; the letters were taken by the cleaners. In the infirmaries they are always aware of all that passes, both in the prison and amongst their friends out of the prison. It appears that there is a general communication among them throughout the prison. have had great intercourse with prisoners, especially after trial, and sometimes after their discharge, and have endeavoured to gain their confidence, and they have admitted that their conversation in the prison has been most demoralizing; that they have related their exploits, and how they performed them; that they have discussed the best methods of picking locks and effecting robberies; what were the best instruments; how to make the best defence, and to trump up a good story, &c. With regard to tread-wheel labour, I believe the prisoners practise various deceptions with the doctor to get into the infirmaries. I find it to be most unfavourable as it respects their moral reformation; no doubt it materially counteracts my efforts. I effect the most good with those whom I see alone. But the system is altogether bad for the purpose of affording them moral instruction.

The 2d Maryland Brigade was re-assigned to the Southern Department on 5 April 1780. The regiment would see action during the Battle of Brandywine, Battle of Germantown, Battle of Monmouth, Battle of Camden and the Battle of Guilford Court House. The regiment was disbanded on 1 January 1783 at Annapolis, Maryland.


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

The two women who thus testified to what they saw and heard of the last act, a kindly one, of John Lang, as he quitted the stage of life, were not of his immediate family. One was Catherine Pope who had married his grandson, John (son of William who was also present) within the year. She was a young woman and was probably acting as a nurse. The other deponent was Elizabeth Banfield, in middle life, the wife of Stephen Lang, who was not of John Lang's immediate line but the son of his brother, Stephen. She too was probably acting as a nurse.



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

The parentage of Arthur Aylworth is yet unknown to his American descendants, but having in view the possibility of its discovery at some future time, various extracts which have come to notice relating to persons of the name in England are inserted here as of interest and of possible value in the prosecution of an inquiry. Following the plan adhered to throughout this work in all quotations from permanent records, the surname is reproduced with the orthography of the record.

As elsewhere stated, it should be remembered that there were two distinct localities in Gloucestershire, Aylworth and Aldesworth, apparently causing some confusion.

In the second year of his reign (1548) Edward VI. sold chantries, colleges, etc. His book of sales of the same contains a memorandum of the sale of ."a mansion and tenement called 'The Mansion-House' of " the College of New-hal in the Mountrey within the city of Well " Yearly value 38£—14s.; purchase 728£—Os—2d.; purchaser John " Ayleworth and Will Lacye." BESIDES Arthur Aylworth, or North Kingstown R. 1., there are early traces of but few persons of the name on this side of the Atlantic.

Francis Aleworth, Dorchester, freeman, May 15, 1631, was chosen lieutenant at a court of Assistants, [Prince ii., Annals 32], but returned to England in March, 1632. Ffrancis Aleworth took the freeman's oath in Boston, May 14, 1634. [New Eng. Hist. and Gen. Reg.]

Edward Aleworth (or Aldworth), aged 13, embarked on the ship Freelove in London for Bormoodcs. June 10, 1635. Elizabeth Aldworth. aged 15, embarked the next year in London for the same destination. where Bartho Aldsworth owned a plantation and slaves, about 1680.

This name is found in the States. Alfred Aldsworth, who, at the time of his death, resided in Williamsburg, and was engaged in mercantile business. mar. June, 1835. Eliza Van Brunt, b. 

The languages of the English courts at that time were French and Latin. These various languages mixed quite freely in the evolving social milieu. The final element of this mix is that medieval scribes spelled words according to their sounds rather than any definite rules, so a name was often spelled in as many different ways as the number of documents it appeared in. The name was spelled Aylworth, Aylesworth, Ayleworth, Ailworth, Ailworth, Hailworth and many more.

First found in Warwickshire where they held a family seat as Lords of the Manor of Kineton. Conjecturally they are descended from a Norman noble who occupied this manor at the time of the taking of the Domesday Book, ^[1] a survey of England initiated by Duke William of Normandy after his conquest of England at Hastings in 1066 A.D. This Norman held his land from the King, and the estates were originally called Quintone, a market village.

Warwickshire (<u>''/'worikʃə/</u> or <u>/'worikʃɪər/</u>) is a <u>landlocked non-metropolitan county</u> in the <u>West Midlands</u> region of <u>England</u>. The <u>county town</u> is <u>Warwick</u>, although the largest town is <u>Nuneaton</u>. The county is famous for being the birthplace of <u>William Shakespeare</u> and <u>George Eliot</u>. Commonly used abbreviations for the county are **Warks** or **Warwicks**.

The county is divided into five districts of <u>North Warwickshire</u>, <u>Nuneaton & Bedworth</u>, <u>Rugby</u>, <u>Warwick</u> and <u>Stratford-on-Avon</u>. The current county boundaries were set in 1974 by the <u>Local Government Act 1972</u>. The <u>historic county boundaries</u> also included <u>Coventry</u> and <u>Solihull</u>, as well as much of <u>Birmingham</u>.

King Edgar in 969 granted 10 hides in Kineton to his thegn Alfwold and his assigns. (fn. 19) At the time of his death in 1066 Edward the Confessor was holding *KINETON*, called 'Quintone' in the Domesday Survey, and Wellesbourne as a manor and its berewick. The whole estate was assessed at only 3 hides, though there were 38 ploughteams there and 130 acres of meadow, as well as woodland. King William retained the estate in his own hand, (fn. 20) and it remained with the Crown until 1198, when King Richard gave it, then valued at £20, to his brother Count John. (fn. 21) In 1202 King John gave to Hugh de Hersy £12 of land in Kineton; (fn. 22) this was in exchange for land in Pillerton [q.v.] which the king had given to Hugh de Gournay and was to revert to the Crown if Hugh de Hersy recovered Pillerton by agreement or by suit of law. (fn. 23) Hugh in 1206 brought an action against Hugh de Gournay(fn. 24) and evidently recovered Pillerton, (fn. 25) so that Kineton reverted to King John, who in 1216 granted the manor to Stephen de Segrave to hold by fee farm of £12. (fn. 26) In 1220 Stephen had a grant of a market on Tuesdays for his manor of Kineton, (fn. 27) to which was added in 1228 a fair on the eve and day of SS. Peter and Paul. (fn. 28)

Sir Stephen de Segrave died in 1241 (fn. 29) and was succeeded by his son Gilbert, whose son Nicholas forfeited Kineton for opposition to Henry III. The manor was given to the king's son Edmund, who granted it to Ralph le Boteler in 1266 (fn. 30) bu following year restored it to Nicholas, (fn. 31) Ralph being compensated with the promise of £400. (fn. 32) Nicholas Segrave of the manor in 1279, when he had 4 carucates of land in demesne and 31 virgates held by sokemen, and had view of frankp gallows, free warren, and other liberties. (fn. 33) The see farm rent of £12 from the manor was granted in 1303 to Queen Margaret (fn. 34) and in 1327 to Queen Isabelle. (fn. 35) John, Lord Segrave, the son of Nicholas, died in 1325 seised of the n the tenants of which included 8 'burgesses', (fn. 36) and his son Stephen died very shortly afterwards, leaving a young son Jo..... 37) This John died in 1353, having married Margaret, Countess (and later Duchess) of Norfolk, who survived him 46 years, and leaving a daughter Elizabeth, (fn. 38) born in 1338. (fn. 39) Elizabeth married John de Mowbray, who died in 1368 seised of the manor of GREAT KINGTON, (fn. 40) which is called 'Cheping Kington' in 1399 on the death of his second son, and eventual heir, Thomas, Duke of Norfolk. (fn. 41) The manor then descended in the Mowbray family until the main line became extinct with the death of Anne, Duchess of York, in 1481. (fn. 42) On the division of the estates between the descendants of the two daughters of Thomas Mowbray, 1st Duke of Norfolk, Kineton came to William, Marquess Berkeley and Earl Marshal, (fn. 43) who in 1490 settled the manor on himself and the heirs of his body, with remainder in default of such heirs to the king in tail male. (fn. 44) Accordingly, on the death of the Marquess without issue in 1492 the manor, then valued at £10, (fn. 45) passed to Henry VII. It remained with the Crown until Edward VI died without issue, when it returned to the right heir of the Marquess (the great-grandson of his brother) Henry, Lord Berkeley. (fn. 46) He sold the manor in 1575 to Francis Aylworth, (fn. 47) who was apparently already tenant of the estate. (fn. 48) Peter Aylworth, son of Francis, in 1617 sold the manor to Sir Fulk Greville, (fn. 49) whose descendants retained it until about 1806, when George, Earl Brooke and Warwick, sold it to John Peyto, Lord Willoughby de Broke, (fn. 50) in whose family it still remains.

ROUTE 31.—WARWICK TO RADWAY VIA WELLES-BOURNE, COMPTON VERNEY, KINETON AND LITTLE KINETON.

LEAVING Warwick by West Street, we take the road viâ Longbridge and Barford, and in six miles reach Wellesbourne, which consists of two divisions, Wellesbourne Hastings, so called from the family of Hastang, to whom that manor was granted by one of the ancient Earls of Warwick, and Wellesbourne Mountford, from a family of the latter name who possessed this manor in the reign of Henry I. The Church, which stands in Wellesbourne Hastings, has a late 15th century embattled tower of ordinary Warwickshire type with pinnacles. The nave and chancel were re-built in 1847 with an absence of appreciation for their ancient features. On the south side of the chancel is a fine Norman arch with cable moulding, which before the renovation formed the entrance to the chancel. In front of the altar is a well preserved brass to Sir Thomas le Strange, Constable of Ireland in the reign of Henry VI., and whose family were lords of the manor from the reign of Richard II. to that of Henry VI., when the property passed by marriage to the Mordaunt family, of Walton. Sir Thomas is clad in armour and the following inscription runs round the verge of the brass:-"Hic iacet Thomas le Straunge miles nuper constabularius regis in hibernia qui obijt tertio die Maij Anno domini MCCCCXXVI. et regni regis Henrici sexti quarto. cuius animæ ppitietur deus." On the south side of the chancel is a tablet to Paul Aylworth, a charitable benefactor, who died 1659. The modern reredos, by Salviati, presented by Lady Charles Paulet, is handsome, and there is a good modern brass on the south wall of the nave to the Rev. Lord Charles Paulet, a former vicar, who died 1870.

•Note: Rev. Chad Brown, immigrant ancestor and founder of the family, came from England in the ship Martin, which arrived in Boston, in the Massachusetts Colony, in July, 1638. He brought with him his wife Elizabeth, son John, then eight years old, and perhaps younger children. A fellow passenger died on the voyage, and Chad Brown witnessed the will soon after his arrival. He did not remain long in the Massachusetts Colony, probably because of his religious views, but soon removed to Providence, where he became at once a leader and one of the most valued citizens of the colony.

That same year, 1638, he and twelve others signed a compact relative to the government of the town. His work in settling the serious difficulties which had arisen between the original thirteen proprietors of Providence, and the later settlers, is thus referred to by Roger Williams: The truth is, Chad Browne, that wise and godly soul (now with God), with myself brought the remaining aftercomers and the first twelve to a oneness by arbitration. Chad Brown was soon afterward appointed in the capacity of surveyor on a committee to compile a list of the home lots of the first settlers of the Towne Street, and the meadows allotted to them . His own home lot fronted on Towne Streete, now South Main street and Market Square, with the southern boundary to the southward of College and South Main streets . The college grounds of Brown University now comprise a large portion of this lot.

In 1640 Chad Brown served as member of a committee with others in regard to the disputed boundary between Providence and Pawtuxet. In the same year he, with Robert Cole, William Harris and John Warner, formed the committee of Providence Colony to report their first written form of government, which was adopted and continued in force until 1644, in which year Roger Williams returned from England with the first charter. Chad Brown was the first of the thirty-nine signers of this agreement. In 1642 Mr. Brown was formally ordained as the first settled pastor of the Baptist church of Providence. At this time, and for more than a half century afterward, the church had no meeting house, but met for worship in a grove or orchard, and in unpleasant weather in the houses of its members. Rev. Chad Brown remained at the head of his church until his death, which occurred about the year 1665.

He seems to have been the first pastor of the First Baptist Church in Providence, the connection of Roger Williams having been of so brief duration, and of so informal a character, as to forbid that he should be recognized as its first pastor. The venerable John Howland says: On the question among the founders of Rhode Island College on what lot to place the building--University Hall--they decided on the present site because it was the home lot of Chad Brown, the first minister of the Baptist Church. Throughout his life in Rhode Island he was classed among those men of culture an ability who were chosen to represent the colony on official business. He was a saintly character, and his influence went far toward establishing and keeping peace among the early settlers. His remains, which were originally interred in a lot not far from where the court house, on the corner of College and Benefit streets, now stands, were removed in 1792 to the North Burying Ground.



29. ROBERT (4)—Robert (3), Robert (2), Arthur (1)—was born Feb. 1, 1742, and married in West Greenwich, R. I., April 12, 1761, Rosanna Straight.

His father gave him by deed, Nov. 28, 1762, ten acres of land in Exeter, R. I., but this lot was, perhaps, conveyed back to the father Feb. 14, 1764.

The statement is made by Albina Ellsworth, of Atco, N. J., that he settled in Shaftsbury, Vt., and that he had two sons who lived in Newfane or Townsend, Windham Co., Vt.; also that in 1838, when her father saw them, they were probably forty or fifty years of age.

30. JOSEPH (4)—Robert (3), Robert (2), Arthur (1)—was born April 1, 1750, [Ex. Rec.] and married Freelove Cowes. They settled in West Greenwich, where they evidently remained until after Nov. 12, 1781. Deeds to land in West Greenwich were made by Joseph and Freelove as late as 1784–5, and nothing indicates that they left Rhode Island before these dates.* They emigrated to Hoosac, N. Y., where he died before Jan. 10, 1794, the date of letters of administration granted to his widow.†

Sir Griffin Markham (d. aft. 1644) was an English soldier.

Life[edit]

He was the son of Thomas Markham and Mary Griffin.[1]

On 29 May 1592, he married Anne Roos. [2] He was knighted in 1594 after serving under the <u>Earl of Essex</u> at the siege of Rouen. [1]

During the <u>Nine Years War</u> he commanded the cavalry under Sir <u>Conyers Clifford</u>, and his opportune arrival and countercharge after the defeat of the infantry at the <u>Battle of Curlew Pass</u>(1599) saved the army from complete disaster. His right arm was broken during the affray.

Markham was banished from court for unknown reasons around 1593. He later took part in the <u>Bye Plot</u> and subsequently the <u>Main Plot</u>, for which he was convicted (1603) and sentenced to death. However, he was reprieved from execution and exiled (1605). His properties were given to his cousin, <u>Sir John Harington</u>.

He spent the rest of his life in exile in Europe, acting as a spy for Robert Cecil. He joined the English regiment in the Low Countries; there he fell out with Sir Edmund Baynham, a conspirator in the Gunpowder Plot, and fought a bloody duel with him. [5]

life as a courtier under James I[edit]

After the queen's death, Harington's fortunes faltered at the court of the new King, James I. He had stood surety for the debts of his cousin, Sir Griffin Markham, in the sum of £4000, when the latter had become involved in the Bye and Main Plots. Not able to meet his cousin's debts without selling his own lands, and unwilling to languish in gaol, he escaped custody in October 1603. However, James I had already recognized his loyalty and created him a Knight of the Bath and also granted him the properties forfeited upon Markham's exile.

Towards the end of his life, Sir John Harington became the tutor to Henry Frederick, Prince of Wales. He annotated for him a copy of Francis Godwin's De praesulibus Angliae. Harington's grandson, John Chetwind later published these annotations in 1653, under the title of A Briefe View of the State of the Church. While tutoring the Prince, he also translated Regimen sanitatis Salernitanum (Health Regimen of the School of Salernum), a medieval collection of health tips, from Italian to English verse, published in 1607 in London at the John Holme and John press.[5]

MARKHAM, SIR GRIFFIN (1564?–1644?), soldier and conspirator, born about 1564, was the eldest of the twelve sons of Thomas Markham of Ollerton, Nottinghamshire, and Kirby Bellars, Leicestershire, by Mary, the heiress of Ryce Griffin of Braybrooke and Dingley, Northamptonshire. He was a first cousin of Robert Markham of Cottam, the father of Francis and Gervase, who are separately noticed. Sir Griffin's father was high steward of Mansfield and standard-bearer to Queen Elizabeth's band of gentlemen pensioners. Some of his brothers gave great trouble to their father by becoming recusants. Robert, the second, went over to Rome in 1592.

Griffin served as a volunteer under Sir Francis Vere in the Netherlands, and he was at the siege of Groningen in 1594. He was afterwards with the Earl of Essex before Rouen, when he received the honour of knighthood. For an offence which does not appear to be specified he was confined in the Gatehouse in 1696, and there are several letters from him at this time preserved at Hatfield. He was soon released. In 1697 he went to Spain, and returned with news of the sailing of a Spanish fleet. He seems to have been turbulent and restless. When the Earl of Essex was sent to Ireland in 1599, Markham served under him in command of all the cavalry in Connaught. Sir John Harington wrote of him as a soldier well acquainted with both the theory and practice of war. On the accession of James I, Markbam became connected with the conspiracy having for its object the accession of Arabella Stuart to the throne. He was apprehended in July 1603, at the same time as Sir Walter Raleigh, Lords Grey and Cobham, Watson a priest, and some others. The proclamation for his arrest described him as 'a man with a large broad face, of a bleak complexion, a big nose, and one of his hands maimed by a shot of a bullet.' The lawyers made out two branches of the plot, called the ' Main ' and the ' Bye,' and there was much false swearing at the trial, which took place at Winchester in November. Markham was accused of having been concerned in the 'Bye' plot. He confessed that he had yielded to the persuasions of Watson, the priest. All the prisoners were convicted of high treason, Brooke and Watson were executed. On 9 Dec. Markham was brought out to a scaffold in front of Winchester Castle, but just as he was putting his head on the block he was ordered by the sheriff to rise, and was led back into the great hall of the castle. Lords Grey and Cobham were treated exactly in the same way. It was then proclaimed by the sheriff that the king had granted them their lives. On the 15th the prisoners were remanded to the Tower. Markham was banished, and his estates confiscated. He had married Anne, daughter of Peter Roos of Laxton, but had no children. He went to the Low Countries, where, in February 1609, he fought a duel with Sir Edmund Baynham 'upon discourse about the Powder Plot,' In the autumn of that year Markham's wife opened communications with Cecil, in the hope of getting a pardon for her husband. In 1610 he was in communication with the English envoy Trumbull at Antwerp (WINWOOD, Memorials, iii. 142). Markham was in close correspondence with Beaulieu, the secretary to the English embassy at Paris, forwarding him information of various kinds, and in one of his letters he speaks of having visited several of the German courts. Markham was living in March 1643-4, when he wrote to the Marquis of Newcastle from Vienna, regretting that his age precluded him from fighting for Charles I (Cal. State Papers, Dom., 1644, pp. 36, 45, 46, 64, and 86). Nothing further is known of him. His brother William assisted in the attempted escape of Lady Arabella Stuart from the Tower in 1611, and died in 1617. There is a pedigree belonging to the present writer, drawn for Markham by William Cam- den, the Clarenceux king of arms, on vellum, twelve feet long, with 165 shields of arms emblazoned on it. The latest date on this pedigee is 1617, and Camden died in 1623, so that the pedigree must have been drawn between those dates. The dates are referred to reigns of German emperors instead of English kings; it was perhaps prepared to assist in gaining Markham an order of knighthood or other distinction at a German court. [There is an account of the trial in the State Trials, and references in the Calendar of State Papers (Domestic), 1603. Many references to the proceedings of Markham occur in the Cecil Correspondence at Hatfield, including Ave letters from Brussels in 1607-8-9, praying for a pardon, in Sir Dudley Carleton's Letters, and in the Lansdowne and Harleian Collections. The letters to Beaulieu from Düsseldorf, 1610-12-23, and one to the Duke of Buckingham from Ratisbon in 1623, are among the Lansdowne MSS. Markham's Pedigree is in Proc. Soc. Antiq. 17 Not. 1859.]

Biography

On his father's death in 1559 Thomas Markham inherited Ollerton, which he made his chief residence, and leases of Bothamsall and Elkesley manors in north Nottinghamshire; his marriage brought him considerable property at Chipping Warden in Northamptonshire; and he purchased the site of the priory of Kirby Bellars in Leicestershire, where he was to spend much of his time after he retired from court.3

As a young man Markham fought in France and Scotland, witnessing the capture of Boulogne in 1544 and the sack of Haddington three years later. It was doubtless his father's adherence to the Earl of Rutland which had obtained for him a place in the earl's household and a combination of noble and paternal support which procured his election for Nottingham to Mary's first Parliament. Both influences are also to be discerned in Markham's conduct in the Commons: he was one of those who opposed the initial measures to restore Catholicism. His religion may have either deterred or helped to debar him from being re-elected under Mary, but with the accession of Elizabeth both he and his father resumed their seats.4

Long afterwards Markham was to remind Elizabeth of his response to her summons when her sister lay dying. He was at Berwick in command of 300 footmen when he received a message from (Sir) Thomas Parry asking him to come with all possible speed to Brocket Hall, Hertfordshire, leaving his men under trustworthy captains; he did so at once, bringing with him the captains' names and signatures 'by which they vowed their dutiful forwardness to adventure their lives in her Majesty's service with 10,000 men'. Happily, nothing of the kind was necessary, but Markham received the new Queen's thanks and was promptly made a gentleman pensioner. He was to spend many years at court and to survive the troubles provoked by his wife's and his son's recusancy. He was buried at Ollerton on 8 Mar. 1607 and administration of his property was granted at York on 30 Apr. following. 5

JAMES BANDFIELD, (son of Sir James and Lady Eleanor), was born in England in 1747.

When James was about 12, he was playing with his cousin, Francis King, and some other boys, on the royal grounds at the rear of the King's palace, which adjoined the Bandfield property.

The boys were having great sport with their sling shots, a common toy of that time, trying to scare some geese swimming idly in a small pond. While showing his skill, James accidentally "slew" one of the "royal" geese! James, knowing that the king (George II) had people beheaded for more trivial things, was badly frightened. His first thought was to run away from the king's wrath and parental punishment. So with the cousin, Francis, who considered himself an accessory to the crime, the two young boys ran as fast as they could to the London Wharfs, where they found a large vessel about to sail.

Stealthily going on board the ship, the boys concealed themselves in the hold and were not discovered until well out to sea. When the ship reached port at Boston, MA, the captain of the vessel had the boys bound out to a ship builder for a term of 5 years, that they might earn money to pay for their passage to America. This was the captain's right according to law in those days.





Descendants of Francis King

Generation No. 1

1. FRANCIS1 KING was born November 25, 1757 in Frederick county, Maryland1,2, and died October 24, 1830 in Ithaca, Tompkins, New York3,4. He married MARY JONES October 31, 1780 in Jones family farm, Somerset co., New Jersey, daughter of JOHN JONES and AGNES. She was born August 15, 1763 in New Jersey, and died May 20, 1844 in Ithaca, Tompkins, New York.

Notes for FRANCIS KING:

- The truth as to the origin of Francis King is unknown to me. The Howland family always said that Francis King was born in Maryland. This story apparently was widely accepted among various King descendants as all the applications for the SAR and DAR that I have seen say that he was born in Maryland, but no one says where. The family tradition was that Francis King was living in or around Anne Arundel co., Maryland, about twenty miles from where he enlisted at the time of his enlistment into the American Revolutionary Army. It was always said that he was born in Frederick county, Maryland.
- I have not found a record of Francis King's birth or a family to associate with him. I recently discovered a reference to a Francis King who died a year after our Francis King was born. He had served during the French and Indian war in Frederick county Maryland. If this is his origin, it may help to explain why there is no record of him. Frederick county was considered back country at this time, and it is likely that Francis faced plenty of difficult times growing up there in the 1760's and early 70's. It is likely his time would have been spent learning the practical necessities for making a living, farming, construction, hunting, fishing, maintenance, and making home brew. Francis King never learned to write, not even his name. This is demonstrated time and again in his making his mark on documents he was to sign.
- The other story has its genesis in the Banfield Family Reunion and was published in the Cuba Patriot Cuba, NY 5 July 1928. It states that when James Banfield was twelve years old, he and Francis King were playing on the Royal lands in England. While playing with sling shots, James killed a royal goose. In fear for their lives, the boys stowed away on a ship that lay at anchor in London. They were discovered after the ship sailed and worked on ship board during the passage to America. When they landed, they were sold into indenture by the captain to pay for their transport to the colony.
- They served together during the American Revolution, married sisters, and remained good friends for the remainder of their lives. While there is good reason to doubt the first part of the story, the second part is true. Francis King and James Banfield served together in the 6th Maryland Line during the Revolution, they did marry sisters. James Banfield married Tabitha Jones and Francis King married Mary Jones, and they both came to Ithaca and lived to the end of their days there. Their descendants always referred to each other as cousins.
- It was also said that James was the descendant of the noble Banfield line in England, and that the Jones were descendents of a royal Welsh line. [It was common in vanity genealogies at the end of the 19th century and beginning of the 20th century to make unsupportable claims of noble and royal linage. Modern genealogy requires supporting documentation to back up a statement of descent.]

- There are problems with the goose story. The first problem with the story is that, according to their grave stones, James Banfield was 10 years older that Francis King. For this tale to be true, Francis would have had to stow away with James when he was age 2. Further research has shown that James Banfield came over on a convict ship and was sold as an indentured convict. This was a common enough event in those days. It was the practice to take many a poor person and convict them of a minor offence, and then transport them to the colonies that were in need of cheap labor. Over 50,000 English men, women and children were transported as *convicts" before the Revolution. One quarter of all those of English descent came to the colonies as an indenture, that were used primarily as labor contracts. James Banfield could neither read or write and signed his will by making his mark. Children of nobility would have been better educated by age 10 or 12. His inability to sign his own name suggests a more common origin.*
- But could the story have been about Francis King and another friend, with James' name replacing the other mans so as to become more "acceptable" to later generations. I found a Francis King and a John Johnson record bound out for passage from London in the Philadelphia archives. I have come to believe, however, that this is the wrong Francis King. Ours would have been only 16 years old at the time. The term of indenture for this Francis King was only one year and nine months, while John Johnson was bound out for a term of four years. Terms of indenture were often set by the value of ones labor, and for someone to serve only one year and nine months, they would have had to have a very special knowledge -- not something too likely for most illiterate 16 year olds.
- Finally, I have not found any knowledge of the goose story of King descendants whose families were not in the upstate NY area in the 1920's when the story was first published. Those that left there area earlier have had no knowledge of it, while those in the area have the same story almost word for word. This further suggests a story of modern origin, and one in written form. when one studies folklore, one looks for drift in the story over time. There has been virtually none in this case.
- The King and Howland family traditions are that Francis King was from Frederick County, Maryland. He was born 25 Nov. 1757, the date copied by his son, Alexander King, into the family bible that later ended up in the National Archives to support the Revolutionary War Pension application. Francis enlisted when age 20 on the 25 Feb 1777 at Carroll Manor or Alexandria, Anne Arundell Co. Md. He served three years in the 6th Maryland Line during the American Revolution. James Banfield's record can be found there as well. National Archives records show that he fought in many battles which include: the Battle of Brandywine, Battle of Long Island, Battle of Stony Point, Battle of Trenton, Battle of Germantown, and the Battle of Monmouth. Historians will note that both the Battle of Brandywine and Long Island took place before the time of King's enlistment. This means that Mary (Jones) King, his widow, made an error was applying for her widow's pension, or Francis had earlier service and may have been a member of a State militia. There is no federal record of his early service. On 10 Apr 1779 he was promoted to corporal. Francis King was present on 1 January 1780, and was mustered out of service on 25 Feb 1780, at or near Madison, New Jersey.
- Both Francis King and James Banfield remained in the area, as they soon became involved with the Jones sisters who lived on their father's farm in Somerset County, New Jersey. On 31 Oct. 1780 both Francis King and James Banfield were married to the two Jones girls, Mary (b. 15 Aug 1763) and Tabitha (b. 1765) respectively. The double wedding was performed by the Rev. Abner Sutton, a traveling Baptist minister. Among others, the wedding was witnessed by Mary and Tabitha's cousin, Moses Barpo who later wrote a letter testifying to the fact in support of Mary's widow's pension. His letter is part of the record in the National Archives. Moses Barpo's letter tells of the wedding at the farm. He also states that they stayed on to help run the farm for at least a year, at which time Moses Barpo was married.
- I speculate that John Jones, Mary and Tabitha's father may have been in poor health. This may have been the reason that Tabitha married at a young age to the older James Banfield. I find no further trace of John Jones, and can only speculate that his wife's name was Agnes, based on the fact that both King and Banfield name children Agnes. I further speculate that the Jones found in the Township of Wantage, Sussex, New Jersey in 1793 are brothers to Mary and Tabitha.

- Francis King, James Banfield next appear on the New Jersey 1793 Military Census in the Township of Wantage in Sussex county, New Jersey along with a Moses and a William Jones. In the winter of 1799 Francis King, Mary and seven children left Wantage to seek a home in the new land known as the "Lake Country" and settled two miles south of Ithaca in a place called "South Hill." They moved upon the ice a great part of the way along the Delaware River probably crossing over from Deposit to Windsor, down the Susquehanna River to Binghamton and Owego, and then across the country by the old Indian trail blazed with marked trees to there place of destination. The journey occupied about three week with oxen and sleds. They had in their team two pair of oxen and two cows, the cows being driven in yoke to make it handier to drive them, and the oxen doing most of the work. At that time there was but one log house between Owego and Ithaca.
- Although they settled on the "Military Tract", neither James nor Francis are among the first purchasers of land on the tract. It now appears that neither received bounty lands in lieu of pay for service in the Revolution. The Military Tract was made available for settlement in 1794/5 and immediately a great deal of land speculation took place. Property changed hands several times before King purchased his piece of wilderness on South Hill. From a later land transaction that recently came to my attention, it appears that Moses Barpo and Francis King bought some land together as stated in a land deed transferring property to Jacob King from Mary King, Francis' widow, who states that it was originally purchased by the two of them. A land sale deed dated 1821 where Mary King, of Tioga County sells 34 acres to Caleb Jessup of Columbia County, NY referred to to a deed from 1799 where James Pumpelly sold 34 acres to Francis King.
- They moved to Ithaca with scanty possessions which included the old grandfather clock with all wooden works which is now (1999) owned by Nick Howland. King also brought the old sergeant's sword that according to family lore is said to have been removed from a dead Hessian after one of the battles. The sword was used as a cheese knife on the South Danby farm for many years and most recently as the ceremonial knife to cut the wedding cake at Charles B. Howland and Beth Saslow's marriage. Charles is also in possession of King's powder horn.
- Francis King took up land on South Hill, across the road from the school house which is still called the King's schoolhouse. King's original house burned in 1827, and with it the King Family bible that he kept. His son, Alexander had copied the information recorded in it, and it is this copy of the birth and marriage pages that are included in the National Archive records. The second house he built is still standing, though much altered. At this place he ran a tavern for a time (1802 to at least 1807), the first stop for drink on the long haul from Ithaca to Owego, over which goods were carried from the head of navigation of St. Lawrence and Central New York waters at Ithaca, to the Susquehanna at Owego which carried the goods to the Chesapeake and Baltimore.
- Francis King had a large family of some 11 children. He used to call them in the morning by standing at the foot of the stairs and in a loud voice shouting the name of each one, beginning with the oldest and going down the line to the youngest. It was said to be an impressive catalogue.
- Francis King used to tell a story that illustrated frontier humor. At a dance held somewhere on South Hill, the talk turned to experiences with wolves and stories were told of certain people having been attacked by them. A young fellow present boasted that wolves held no terror for him and he would like to see them attack him. Some of the men left the party early and concealed themselves in the woods along the path the young man would take. He left the party very late and as he was going along the wooded road along, the concealed jokers began to howl like wolves. The young fellow raised his gun and pointed it first one way and then another but could not see any animals, only hear their howls. Presently his nerve gave way, he dropped his gun and climbed a tree. There he remained until daylight, when the jokers showed themselves and began to rag him about his terrors in the night. He never lived down the story but was always being twitted about the matter from that time on.
- There must have been innumerable stories about the Revolution that were told and retold on long winter nights. One that Francis King's grandson remembered and passed along was that he he often heard grandfather King say that the best meal he ever had was a cat which he succeeded in killing when in camp. The old man used to add that he had often thought he would kill him another cat some time and see if it tasted as good as that first one--but he had never got around to do it.



I don't believe that James Wilson on our family tree is related to James Wilson signer of the "Declaration of Independence". The other story has its genesis in the Banfield Family Reunion and was published in the Cuba Patriot - Cuba, N.Y. 5 July 1928. It states that when James Banfield was twelve years old, he and Francis King were playing on the Royal lands in England. While playing with sling shots, James killed a royal goose. In fear for their lives, the boys stowed away on a ship that lay at anchor in London. They were discovered after the ship sailed and worked on ship board during the passage to America. When they landed, they were sold into indenture by the captain to pay for their transport to the colony.

They served together during the American Revolution, married sisters, and remained good friends for the remainder of their lives. While there is good reason to doubt the first part of the story, the second part is true. Francis King and James Banfield served together in the 6th Maryland Line during the Revolution, they did marry sisters. James Banfield married Tabitha Jones and Francis King married Mary Jones, and they both came to Ithaca and lived to the end of their days there. Their descendants always referred to each other as cousins.

It was also said that James was the descendant of the Banfield Nobel line in England, and that the Jones were descendants of a royal Welsh line as well. [It was common in vanity genealogies at the end of the 19th century and beginning of the 20th century to make unsupportable claims of noble and royal lineage. Modern genealogy requires supporting documentation to back up a statement of descent.]

The problem with the first part of the story is that James Banfield was 10 years older that Francis King. For this tale to be true, Francis would have had to stow away with James when he was age 2. Further research has shown that James Banfield indeed came over on a convict ship and was sold as an indentured convict. This was a common enough event in those days. It was the practice to take many a poor person and convict them of a minor offence, and then transport them to the colonies which were in need of cheap labor. Over 50,000 English men, women and children were so transported as "convicts" before the Revolution. One quarter of all those of English descent came to the colonies as an indenture, which were used primarily as labor contracts.

But could the story have been about Francis King and another friend, with James' name replacing the other mans so as to become more "acceptable" to later generations. I found a Francis King and a John Johnson record bound out for passage from London in the Philadelphia archives. I have come to believe, however, that this is the wrong Francis King. Ours would have been only 16 years old at the time. The term of indenture for this Francis King was only one year and nine months, while John Johnson was bound out for four years. Terms of indenture were often set by the value of ones labor, and for someone to serve only one year and nine months, they would have had to have a very special knowledge -- not something too likely for most illiterate 16 year olds.

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I speculate that John Jones, Mary and Tabitha's father may have been in poor health. This may have been the reason that Tabitha married at a young age to the older James Banfield. I find no further trace of John Jones, and can only speculate that his wife's name was Agnes, based on the fact that both King and Banfield name children Agnes. I further speculate that the Jones found in the Township of Wantage in Sussex are brothers to Mary and Tabitha.

Francis King, James Banfield next appear on the New Jersey 1793 Military Census in the Township of Wantage in Sussex county, New Jersey along with a Moses and a William Jones. In the winter of 1796 Francis King, Mary and seven children started to seek a home in the new country known as the Lake Country and settled two miles south of Ithaca. They moved upon the ice a great part of the way along the Delaware River probably crossing over from Deposit to Windsor, down the Susquehanna River to Binghamton and Owego, and then across the country by the old Indian trail blased with marked trees to there place of destination. The journey occupied about three week with oxen and sleds. They had in their team two pair of oxen and two cows, the cows being driven in yoke to make it handier to drive them, and the oxen doing most of the work. At that time there was but one log house between Owego and Ithaca

Although they settled on the "Military Tract", neither James nor Francis are among the first purchasers of land on the tract. It now appears that neither received bounty lands in lieu of pay for service in the Revolution. The Military Tract was made available for settlement in 1794/5 and immediately a great deal of land speculation too place. Property changed hands several times before King purchased his piece of wilderness on South Hill.

He spent some time in a debtors prison (while still serving on the Supreme Court!). He signed both the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution.

Early life

Born in Carskerdo, near St. Andrews, Scotland to William Wilson and Alison Landall. Wilson attended a number of universities in Scotland without attaining a degree. Imbued with the ideas of the Scottish Enlightenment he moved to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in British America in 1766, carrying valuable letters of introduction. These helped Wilson to begin tutoring and then teaching at The Academy and College of Philadelphia (now the University of Pennsylvania). He petitioned there for a degree and was awarded an honorary Master of Arts several months later.

Wilson began to read the law at the office of John Dickinson a short time later. After two years of study he attained the bar in Philadelphia, and, in the following year (1767), set up his own practice in Reading, Pennsylvania. His office was very successful and he earned a small fortune in a few years. By then he had a small farm near Carlisle, Pennsylvania, was handling cases in eight local counties, and was lecturing at The Academy and College of Philadelphia.

On 5 November 1771, he married Rachel Bird, daughter of William Bird and Bridgette Hulings, they had six children together: Mary, William, Bird, James, Emily and Charles. Rachel died in 1786, and in 1793 he married Hannah Gray, daughter of Ellis Gray and Sarah D'Olbear; the marriage produced a son named Henry, who died at age three. Hannah had previously been the widow of Thomas Bartlett, M.D.

Revolution

Taking up the revolutionary cause, Wilson published in 1774 "Considerations on the Nature and Extent of the Legislative Authority of the British Parliament." In this pamphlet, Wilson argued that the Parliament had no authority to pass laws for the American colonies because the colonies had no representation in Parliament. It presented his views that all power derived from the people. Though considered by scholars on par with the seminal works of Thomas Jefferson and John Adams of the same year, it was actually penned in 1768, perhaps the first cogent argument to be formulated against British dominance. He was a federalist.

In 1775 he was commissioned Colonel of the 4th Cumberland County Battalion and rose to the rank of Brigadier General of the Pennsylvania State Militia.

As a member of the Continental Congress in 1776, James Wilson was a firm advocate for independence. Believing it was his duty to follow the wishes of his constituents, Wilson refused to vote until he had caucused his district. Only after he received more feedback did he vote for independence. While serving in the Congress, Wilson was clearly among the leaders in the formation of Native American policy. "If the positions he held and the frequency with which he appeared on committees concerned with Indian affairs are an index, he was until his departure from Congress in 1777 the most active and influential single delegate in laying down the general outline that governed the relations of Congress with the border tribes."

Wilson also served from June 1776 on the Committee on Spies, along with John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, John Rutledge, and Robert Livingston. They together defined treason. (Page, p. 119.)

On October 4, 1779 the Fort Wilson Riot began. After the British had abandoned Philadelphia, James Wilson successfully defended at trial 23 people from property seizure and exile by the radical government of Pennsylvania. A mob whipped up by liquor and the writings and speeches of Joseph Reed, President of Pennsylvania's Supreme Executive Council, marched on Congressman Wilson's home at Third and Walnut Streets. Wilson and 35 of his colleagues barricaded themselves in his home, later nicknamed Fort Wilson. In the fighting that ensued, six died, and 17 to 19 were wounded. The city's soldiers, the First Troop Philadelphia City Cavalry and Baylor's 3rd Continental Light Dragoons, eventually intervened and rescued Wilson and his colleagues. The rioters were pardoned and released by Joseph Reed

In 1779 Wilson accepted the role of Advocate General for France in America. He held this post until 1783.

Constitutional Convention

One of the most prominent lawyers of his time, Wilson is credited for being the most learned of the Framers of the Constitution. A fellow delegate in the Constitutional Convention of 1787 in Philadelphia made the following assessment of James Wilson: "Government seems to have been his peculiar study, all the political institutions of the world he knows in detail, and can trace the causes and effects of every revolution from the earliest stages of the Grecian commonwealth down to the present time."

Wilson's most lasting impact on the country came as member of the Committee of Detail, which produced the first draft of the United States Constitution in 1787 (a year after the death of his wife). He wanted senators and the president to be popularly elected. He also proposed the Three-Fifths Compromise at the convention, which made slaves count as three-fifths of a person for representation in the House and Electoral College. Along with James Madison, he was perhaps the best versed of the framers in the study of political economy. He understood clearly the central problem of dual sovereignty (nation and state) and held a vision of an almost limitless future for the United States. Wilson addressed the Convention one hundred-sixty-eight times. (World Book Encyclopedia, 2003, James Wilson article.) A witness to Wilson's performance during the convention, Dr. Benjamin Rush, called Wilson's mind "one blaze of light." ("James Wilson: A Forgotten Father," St. John, Gerald J., in The Philadelphia Lawyer, www.philadelphiabar.org.)

Though not in agreement with all parts of the final, necessarily compromised, Constitution, Wilson stumped hard for its adoption, leading Pennsylvania, at its ratifying convention, to become the second state (behind Delaware) to accept the document. His October 6, 1787 speech in the State House Yard has been seen as particularly important in setting the terms of the ratification debate, both locally and nationally. In particular, it focused on the fact that there would be a popularly elected national government for the first time. Wilson was later instrumental in the redrafting of the 1776 Pennsylvania State constitution, leading the group in favor of a new constitution, and entering into an agreement with William Findley (leader of the Constitutionalist Party) that limited the partisan feeling that had previously characterized Pennsylvanian politics.

Supreme Court Appointment

He was nominated to be a Justice of the United States Supreme Court by George Washington on September 24, 1789, after the court was implemented under the Judiciary Act of 1789. He was confirmed by the United States Senate on September 26, 1789, and received commission on September 29, 1789. Only nine cases were heard by the court from his appointment in 1789 until his death in 1798.

He became the first professor of law at the College of Philadelphia in 1790—only the second at any academic institution in the United States—in which he mostly ignored the practical matters of legal training. Like many of his educated contemporaries, he viewed the academic study of law as a branch of a general cultured education, rather than solely as a prelude to a profession.

Wilson broke off his first course of law lectures in April 1791 to attend to his duties as Supreme Court justice on circuit. He appears to have begun a second-year course in late 1791 or in early 1792 (by which time the College of Philadelphia had been merged into the University of Pennsylvania), but at some unrecorded point the lectures stopped again and were never resumed. They were not published (except for the first) until after his death, in an edition produced by his son, Bird Wilson, in 1804. The University of Pennsylvania Law School in Philadelphia officially traces its foundation to Wilson's lectures.

Wilson's final years were marked by financial failures. He assumed heavy debts investing in land that became liabilities with the onset of the Panic of 1796-1797. Of note was the failure in Pennsylvania with Theophilus Cazenove. Wilson was briefly imprisoned for a small debt in Burlington, New Jersey. His son paid the debt, but Wilson went to North Carolina to escape other creditors. He was again briefly imprisoned, but continued his duties on the Federal judicial circuit. In 1798, he suffered a bout of malaria and then died of a stroke at the age of 55, while visiting a friend in Edenton, North Carolina. He was buried in the Johnston cemetery on Hayes Plantation near Edenton, but was reinterred in 1906 at Christ Churchyard, located in Philadelphia.

"Tracing over the events of Wilson's life, we are impressed by the lucid quality of his mind. With this went a restless energy and insatiable ambition, an almost frightening vitality that turned with undiminished energy and enthusiasm to new tasks and new ventures. Yet, when all has been said, the inner man remains, despite our probings, an enigma." – Charles Page Smith, James Wilson: Founding Father, 1956, p. 393

Jurisprudence

In the lectures mentioned above, James Wilson, among the first of American legal philosophers, worked through in more detail some of the thinking suggested in the opinions issuing at that time from the Supreme Court. He felt, in fact, compelled to begin by spending some time in arguing out the justification of the appropriateness of his undertaking a course of lectures. But he assures his students that: "When I deliver my sentiments from this chair, they shall be my honest sentiments: when I deliver them from the bench, they shall be nothing more. In both places I shall make — because I mean to support — the claim to integrity: in neither shall I make — because, in neither, can I support — the claim to infallibility." (First lecture, 1804 Philadelphia ed.)

With this, he raises the most important question of the era: having acted upon revolutionary principles in setting up the new country, "Why should we not teach our children those principles, upon which we ourselves have thought and acted? Ought we to instil into their tender minds a theory, especially if unfounded, which is contradictory to our own practice, built on the most solid foundation? Why should we reduce them to the cruel dilemma of condemning, either those principles which they have been taught to believe, or those persons whom they have been taught to revere?" (First lecture.)

That this is no mere academic question is revealed with a cursory review of any number of early Supreme Court opinions. Perhaps it is best here to quote the opening of Justice Wilson's opinion in Chisholm v. State of Georgia, 2 U.S. 419 (1793), one of the most momentous decisions in American history: "This is a case of uncommon magnitude. One of the parties to it is a State; certainly respectable, claiming to be sovereign. The question to be determined is, whether this State, so respectable, and whose claim soars so high, is amenable to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of the United States? This question, important in itself, will depend on others, more important still; and, may, perhaps, be ultimately resolved into one, no less radical than this 'do the people of the United States form a Nation?'"

In order to arrive at an answer to this question, one that would provide the foundation for the United States of America, Wilson knew that legal thinkers had to resolve in their minds clearly the question of the difference between "the principles of the constitutions and governments and laws of the United States, and the republics, of which they are formed" and the "constitution and government and laws of England." He made it quite clear that he thought the American items to be "materially better." (First lecture.)
